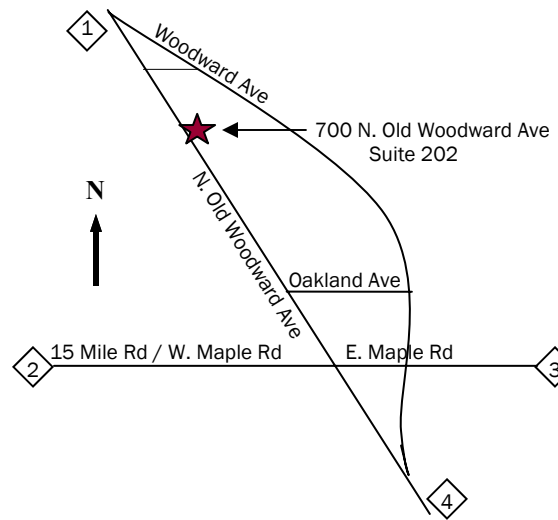

- ① Going south on Woodward, stay in the right lane. Take the split to the right onto N. Old Woodward.

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Could Your Child's Headaches and Reading Difficulties be caused by their Eyes?

Common Symptoms

“I’ve been getting more and more headaches, especially at the end of the of the school day.”

“I’ve never liked reading. Ever since 2nd grade, it’s been my least favorite subject.”

“I get very frustrated when it takes me so long to do my homework.”

“I get car-sick often.”

“I have trouble understanding what I’m reading.”

Children who describe some or all of these symptoms often have an undiagnosed visual condition. Farsightedness, astigmatism and vertical heterophoria are common causes of these symptoms, yet they are frequently not diagnosed during a standard optometric exam. ***Doctors who specialize in the diagnosis of vertical heterophoria and the other childhood conditions will be able to diagnose and treat them.***

Farsightedness is a condition where the eyes see far-away objects clearly but causes an uncomfortable strain on the eye muscles as they try to see clearly up close.

Astigmatism is a condition where the front surface of the eye is not perfectly round, creating distortion of the image such that parts of the image are out of focus.

Vertical Heterophoria is a condition where one eye sees the image higher than the other eye.

In all of these conditions, the brain attempts to bring the visual objects into clear focus by straining the muscles in and around the eyes. This can cause a number of symptoms

including headaches, eye strain, lightheadness, dizziness and a feeling of being disoriented or off balance.

Other symptoms may include:

- Words running together while reading.
- Skipping lines or losing your place while reading.
- Closing or covering one eye while reading.
- Double or overlapping vision.
- Clumsiness
- Difficulties being fit with previous pairs of glasses.
